About The Event

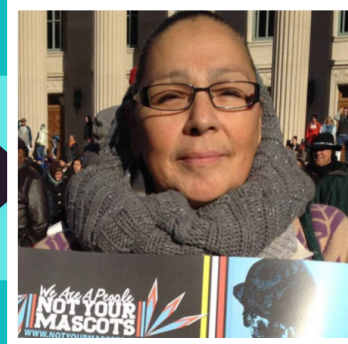
